Personalia

Martin Kroh ist seit dem 15. Juni 2003 für die SOEP Studie tätig. Er hat die Pflichtaufgaben von Markus Pannenberg übernommen und beschäftigt sich mit Gewichtung und Hochrechnung der SOEP Daten. News from Cornell:

After a long and seemingly endless winter, spring has arrived at Cornell University. Despite the urge to hibernate, the GSOEP/CNEF research team has been busy.

DIW Research Professor *Richard Burkhauser* and DIW Research Affiliate *Dr. Dean Lillard* are preparing a paper using GSOEP, BHPS, and PSID data to present at the joint EPUNet-2003 and BHPS-2003 conference July 3-5 in Colchester, UK. They investigate the robustness of cross-sectional correlations between income inequality and self-reported measures of health

GSOEP Cornell team member *Mathis Schroeder* presented a paper in Washington, DC at the Social Security Retirement Research Conference in May, 2003 comparing measures of employment status of disabled and non disabled respondents in the PSID and CPS. This paper is the preliminary analysis for a cross-national comparison of employment and disability using the PSID and GSOEP data.

Everyone has also been busy preparing for the upcoming *Workshop for Users of the German Socio-Economic Panel (GSOEP) and the Cross-National Equivalent Files (CNEF)* to be held September 4-6, 2003 at Cornell University. See the announcement below for more details.

Workshop for Users of the German Socio- Economic Panel (GSOEP) and the Cross-National Equiva- lent Files (CNEF) September 4-6, 2003 at Cornell University/USA

With funding from the SOEP Study - Berlin and Cornell University, the Department of Policy Analysis and Management at Cornell University will, in coordination with the SOEP group and Statistics Canada, hold a workshop to introduce researchers to the German Socio-Economic Panel (GSOEP) and the Cross-National Equivalent Files (CNEF). Eighteen waves of GSOEP data are available to researchers interested in using this rich panel study. The CNEF currently includes data from four countries' panel studies, the GSOEP, the British Household Panel Study (BHPS), the Canadian Survey of Income and Labour Dynamics (SLID), and the United States Panel Study of Income Dynamics (PSID). Data from each of these studies have been extracted and manipulated to facilitate cross-national comparative studies. The resulting subset of variables from each study constitutes the Cross-National Equivalent Files.

The purpose of the workshop is to introduce and familiarize new users with the file structure and potential of the GSOEP and CNEF data. Current users will also benefit from sessions with highly trained researchers who will explain more subtle issues involved, e.g. in analyses that use the GSOEP sample of residents of the former East Germany.

Instructional Facilities

The workshop will be run by Joachim Frick and Markus Grabka of the DIW Berlin (GSOEP and GSOEP-CNEF), Dean Lillard and Mathis Schroeder of Cornell University (PSID-CNEF), Elana Bardasi of Essex University, UK, (BHPS-CNEF), and Philip Giles of Statistics Canada (SLID-CNEF).

Curriculum

The workshop will consist of seven sessions covering the following topics:

- Introduction to the GSOEP file structure
- Merging Household and Person specific files
 - Sample issues
 - Clustered sampling
 - Sample attrition
 - Sample weights
 - Issues when comparing residents of east and west German states
- Cross-sectional versus longitudinal research
- Constructing Calendar data from Spell files
- Web-based user support
- Introduction to the CNEF file structure
- Linking CNEF files to their parent survey data
 - PSID
 - BHPS
 - GSOEP
- Procedures for accessing the SLID Equivalent file

The workshop will begin with a reception and keynote speech on the evening of September 4th. Sessions will be held all day September 5th and in the morning of September 6th.

Costs

The workshop fee is \$200, which includes all instructional materials, the welcoming receptions and lunches on September 5th and 6th. The fee also includes the cost of a copy of the Public Use Version of the GSOEP and the CNEF data, subject to the approval of a written contract for their use by either the DIW or the UK Data Archive.

Hotel accommodations are available at the reduced rate of \$89 per night at the Ithaca Ramada Inn.

Scholarships

Funds provided by Cornell University and the SOEP Study allow us to offer partial scholarships on a competitive basis to offset transportation, hotels, and registration fees.

Application Dates

Applications for the workshop should be postmarked no later than August 1, 2003. Applications for scholarships should be postmarked no later than July 15th, 2003. Applications will be considered in the order in which they arrive. The workshop will be limited to 20 people.

Scholarship Application

To be considered for a scholarship, applicants must submit:

1. A letter stating why they are interested in coming to the workshop,
2. A brief description of the research they will pursue with the GSOEP and/or CNEF data,
3. A statement attesting that funds to cover the workshop costs are not available from their university or research institute.
4. Graduate students or research associates should include a supporting letter from their senior advisor with their application.
5. Junior faculty members should send a letter of support from a senior faculty member.



Winners of the SOEP Prize 2003 will be honored on SOEP Anniversary Conference July 7-8, 2003

On May 14th, 2003 the best SOEP-Papers for the years 2001-2002/3 were announced at the annual meeting of the Society of Friends of the DIW Berlin (VdF). The prize winners will be honored at the SOEP Anniversary Conference on July 7-8, 2003.

Out of more than 260 eligible publications in SOEPLIT, 23 were nominated. The prize winners were chosen by members of the GSOEP advisory board: *Prof. Daniel S. Hamermesh*, Ph.D., University of Texas at Austin, and *Prof. Dr. Gisela Trommsdorff*, University of Konstanz, as

well as SOEP Director *Prof. Dr. Gert G. Wagner*.

The prize is sponsored by the Society of Friends of the DIW (Vereinigung der Freunde des DIW). It is threefold and honors

- the best scientific publication,
- the best scientific publication by a junior researcher (not older than 35 years),
- the best policy paper (including papers in popular media and essays by journalists).

Publications are eligible if they are based on SOEP data and have been published since the last award.

Nomination of papers for the SOEP Prize 2005

The SOEP Prize is awarded bi-annually between the GSOEP Conferences. You can already apply for the *SOEP Prize 2005*:

Organization and regulations

The prize is threefold and honors

- the best scientific publication,
- the best scientific publication by a junior researcher (not older than 35 years),
- the best policy paper (including papers in popular media and essays written by journalists).

Up to €5000 can be awarded to the publications.

Eligibility and Nomination

Publications are eligible if they are based on SOEP/GSOEP data and have been published since the last award. This means that the

- *period of eligibility is February 16, 2003 to December 31, 2004.*

Papers with authors/co-authors belonging to the SOEP Project Group or the SOEP Advisory Board are not eligible.

A *pre-condition* for eligibility is the registration of the paper in our database SOEPlit. In other words, the SOEP Prize is not only an incentive to publish high-quality papers, but also an incentive to send in publications to the SOEP office. The reason for the latter incentive is most important: A continuous stream of strong publications is the best basis for funding a panel study. The registration rule will be strictly enforced: Publications which are not registered prior to the deadline of registration are not eligible. *Please check if your publications are registered.* The most efficient way to do this is by retrieving SOEPlit via the Internet. You will find SOEPlit on the SOEP-homepage (<http://www.diw.de/soep>).

What is a publication?

In order to be considered eligible for the SOEP Prize, an original work has to be published in either a scientific or a popular journal/newspaper or as a book (or book chapter) printed by a publishing company. Discussion papers, Ph.D. theses ("Doktorarbeiten") and the like are not eligible.

Nomination

Only papers which are nominated will be considered for the SOEP Prize. Papers can be nominated either by the authors themselves or by colleagues.

All research papers which are nominated are automatically considered for the general prize (*best paper*). Papers which are nominated for the *junior prize* must be authored by a scholar not older than 35

years when the paper was published. We are aware of the fact that there are better criteria than age for defining a "junior"

category of researchers, but due to very different academic systems in an international context, age is the only criterion which works without any problems. In the case of *multiple authors*, the *principal author* must fit the age criterion for meeting the eligibility of the junior prize.

Any paper can be nominated for the *policy analysis prize*. The Prize Committee will decide whether a paper is really a policy analysis-paper. *Please note:* in the policy analysis category, newspaper articles are very welcome for submission.

Each paper may be honored in one category only. In case that a junior-paper or a policy analysis-paper is voted as the very best paper, no first prize will be awarded in this category.

The Committee for the SOEP prizes will be made up by members of the advisory board of SOEP. Three distinguished scholars from the field of economics and social science will decide on the 2003 award.

Deadlines

Registration: For the 2005 SOEP-prize only papers registered no later than

- *December 31, 2004*

are eligible. Please make sure that all your eligible publications are registered in SOEPLIT. Any missing publications should be sent to the SOEP office at the German Institute for Economic Research (DIW) before December 31, 2004.

Nomination: The deadline for nomination is

- *January 31, 2005.*

It is not necessary to submit the paper itself; sending us the title and the reference number in SOEPLIT is sufficient. It is possible to send in a nomination for yourself or another colleague. If the paper is eligible for the junior prize and/or the public policy prize, please note the prize category. For the junior prize some notification of the birth date of the principal author is necessary. Nomination must be

sent either by fax to the SOEP-office (-109, keyword: SOEP-prize) or by e-mail to <soep-prize@diw.de>.

His research interests are in the field of Social Security and Social Justice in a cross-national context.

Jörg-Peter Schräpler, from the Ruhr University in Bochum, is now working part-time for the SOEP Group. Dr. Schräpler is a specialist in the analysis of survey artifacts. He brings with him valuable experience from extensive research visits at the University of Maryland and at the University of Essex.

Markus Pannenberg and *Gert G. Wagner* were elected to become members of the chapter "Economics of Education" of the *Verein für Socialpolitik*, the leading association of economists in Germany.

On May 26, 2003 the "Zuwanderungsrat" (Council on Immigration and Integra- tion), which was formed last year by the Federal Ministry of Interior Affairs, started its work. *Gert G. Wagner* is one of six experts who have been appointed

as members of this council. The main objectives are regular evaluation of national acceptance and integration capacities, as well as the current developments in immigration.
