The data from the core questions in the first wave of the SOEP Innovation Sample (SOEP IS) 2011 are now available and will be distributed in “long format” (see [page 5](#)). There is still time up to the end of this year to submit question concepts for the next SOEP Innovation Sample (SOEP-IS) in 2014. The best research questions will be chosen in a refereed selection process (see [page 5](#)).

The Institute for Employment Research (IAB) in Nuremberg and the SOEP have entered into a partnership to survey immigrants to Germany. The dataset will be integrated into the SOEP. For some of these respondents in the more than 2500 households surveyed, it will be possible to link the survey data with the precise labor market information from the social insurance data. See [page 6](#) for more.

In the Comment in this newsletter, SOEP Director Jürgen Schupp reports on perspectives of SOEP metadata. The SOEP is currently working to create a new version of our popular SOEPinfo that meets current IT standards and that also is better able to deal with the increasing complexities of the various SOEP studies.

The latest SOEP Wave Report 2012 has just been published. It provides a broad overview of the SOEP’s work in the last year, covering fieldwork for the survey in 2012, special survey modules, staff activities, recent trends, planned future studies, and publications of the SOEP team. The Future SOEP Metadata Portal: DDI on Rails

When the SOEP brought out its first longitudinal data releases in the mid-1980s, the documentation on questions that had been asked either once or repeatedly and on the underlying variables in the dataset were provided in the form of simple tables created using a word processing program. In the late 1980s, these tables were transferred into the then widely used database management system dBASE. From there, it wasn't far to our documentation system **SOEPinfo**, which has been developed continuously since then and is still in use today. By the end of the 1990s, this documentation portal programmed principally by our IT specialist Ingo **Sieber** already allowed our user community a simple and practical point of entry to a SOEP data structure that was becoming more complex with each successive wave. By means of a web-based basket and a script generator that can be used in most common statistical software packages that are used for the SOEP data, even first-time users are able to conduct their own independent longitudinal SOEP analyses with confidence after an introductory workshop of just a few hours.

Data Documentation Initiative (DDI)

Software developers have produced a series of alternative products for metadata portals in recent years that are designed in line with the open metadata model of the Data Documentation Initiative (DDI) for the description of data from the social and economic sciences. Just a few years ago, this metadata model was converted and expanded from the typical cross-sectional use of time series data into a metadata standard (DDI.3) that is also appropriate for use with panel data.

Developing SOEPinfo further: "DDI on Rails"

The DDI has set the new standard for research data and has guided our work in developing SOEPinfo further. For almost two years now, our IT experts in the SOEP group have been working on a new metadata portal generation. Marcel Hebing has christened the new metadata portal he has conceptualized for SOEP "DDI on Rails," and it will soon be launched in beta. In contrast to comparable products, DDI on Rails is independent of any specific study and was developed as an open source

software. In the future, the documentation will also include different versions of the data (releases) and will reflect the specific features of longitudinal studies. We also expect the new system to be easy to maintain and develop further.

Three guiding principles

The three guiding principles for the design of the new metadata system were (a) to create an "open source" software that would allow our solution to be applied by other longitudinal studies, (b) to adhere to the "DDI standard" to ensure the possibility of integration into other retrieval systems, and (c) to maintain the full functionality of SOEPinfo. Our vision is that the SOEP data portal DDI on Rails will accompany researchers throughout the entire course of their research projects from conception to publication. The system offers researchers the possibility to explore the SOEP data and to compile personalized datasets, and it reflects the specific features of longitudinal studies. The SOEPinfo database of SOEP-based publications will also be integrated into DDI on Rails soon and will be searchable.

DDI on Rails Understanding Data

"Open source" solution to be applied by other studies

DDI on Rails will initially document the SOEP longitudinal data, like SOEPinfo. But since the system is conceptualized independently of any specific study, the data from the many SOEP pretests and the SOEP Innovation Sample (SOEP-IS) will be searchable and linkable as well. And it is planned that the growing number of Related Studies (SOEP-RS), such as the currently running Families in Germany (FiD) and the Berlin Aging Study (BASE II), will be covered by this data portal as well. The "SOEP family" is—of course—also open to further studies that are still in the conceptualization, planning, or implementation stage.

The SOEP team is also pursuing the aim of providing this metadata portal solution to other longitudinal studies as a special service of the SOEP infrastructure. We would be delighted to count you among the first test users of DDI on Rails.

Hintergrund

Schon länger besteht in den Sozial- und Wirtschaftswissenschaften Einigkeit darüber, dass viele Forschungsfragen nur im Längsschnitt adäquat untersucht werden können. Längsschnittliche Forschungsdaten werden deshalb immer häufiger genutzt. Sie setzen aufgrund ihrer komplexen Datenstruktur bestimmte Kenntnisse und Erfahrungen im Datenhandling voraus, die in der universitären Lehre nur begrenzt vermittelt werden (können).

In den letzten Jahren werden jedoch mehr und mehr auch andere, komplexe Datenbestände in den Sozial- und Wirtschaftswissenschaften aufgebaut, die die sozialen Kontexte, in denen Individuen und Haushalte eingebunden sind, abbilden. Dazu zählen Daten über Partnerschaften und Beziehungsstrukturen, Betriebe und Unternehmen. Letztere sind nicht nur für die Organisationsforschung im engeren Sinne, sondern zunehmend auch für andere Forschungsfelder wichtig, z.B. die Arbeitsmarktforschung, die Konjunkturforschung oder die familien- oder ungleichheitssoziologische Forschung.

Ort, Zeit und vermittelte Datensätze

Beim diesjährigen datalab-Workshop vom 23. bis 27. September 2013 an der Universität Bielefeld werden die Nutzungsmöglichkeiten des SOEP, des Beziehungs- und Familienpanels (pairfam) sowie der Betriebs- und Linked-Employer-Employee-Datensätze (Mannheimer Innovationspanel, Datensätze des ifo Instituts und SOEP-Linked-Employer-Employee Datensatz, SOEP-LEE) vorgestellt.

Organisation

Organisiert wird die Veranstaltung vom Sonderforschungsbereich 882 „Von Heterogenitäten zu Ungleichheiten“ an der Universität Bielefeld, der GESIS und dem SOEP in Kooperation mit den Forschungsdatenzentren pairfam, ZEW und ifo sowie dem Datenservicezentrum für Betriebs- und Organisationsdaten (DSZ-BO).

SOEP-Modul vom 23. bis 27. September 2013

Der Workshop bietet eine praxisorientierte Einführung in die Nutzung dieser Datensätze. Im ersten SOEP-Modul (23.-25. September 2013) wird ein umfassender Überblick über Aufbau und Analysepotentiale des SOEP gegeben. Unsere KollegInnen Marco **Giesselmann**, Rainer **Siegers** und Frederike **Esche** werden dabei verschiedene methodische Aspekte (wie Stichprobenziehung, Gewichtung und Imputation) vorstellen. Neben den Kernthemen des SOEP, die in Vorlesungen und praktischen Übungen behandelt werden, bietet unsere Migrationsexpertin Ingrid **Tucci** in diesem Jahr zusätzlich eine Überblicksveranstaltung zum SOEP in der Migrations- und Integrationsforschung. Michael **Weinhardt** vom SOEP stellt den Organisations-Datensatz SOEP-LEE vor.

Modul Auswertungsverfahren für Paneldaten vom 26.-27. September 2013

Das zweite Modul (26.-27. September 2013) widmet sich schwerpunktmäßig Auswertungsverfahren für Paneldaten. Durch Lehrvorträge und darauf bezogene praktische Übungen wird ein vertiefter Einblick in (1) grundlegende und (2) fortgeschrittene Verfahren der Längsschnittanalyse sowie ihre Nutzungspotentiale gegeben (Einführung in die Panelregression, Panelregression mit dichotomen abhängigen Variablen, Analyse von Dyaden und Strukturgleichungsmodelle). Neben gemeinsamen Veranstaltungen für die Workshop-TeilnehmerInnen gibt es jeweils parallel ablaufende Übungen, in denen die entsprechenden Verfahren auf Basis der Datensätze SOEP und pairfam angewendet werden.

Gesamtevaluation ehe- und familienbezogener Maßnahmen und Leistungen

Im Auftrag des Bundesministeriums für Familie, Senioren, Frauen und Jugend (BMFSFJ) und des Bundesministeriums der Finanzen (BMF) wurden seit Herbst 2009 zentrale ehe- und familienbezogene Leistungen im Rahmen einer leistungsübergreifenden Systemevaluation untersucht. Konkret geht es um das Zusammenwirken ehe- und familienbezogener Leistungen bezogen auf fünf familienpolitische Ziele: Vereinbarkeit von Familie und Beruf, Wahlfreiheit, gute Entwicklung von Kindern, wirtschaftliche Stabilität von Familien und Nachteilsausgleich, Erfüllung von Kinderwünschen.

Schwerpunkte

Dabei werden folgende zentrale ehe- und familienbezogenen Leistungen betrachtet: Kindergeld und Kinderfreibetrag, Elterngeld, höheres Arbeitslosengeld für Arbeitslose mit Kindern, Sozialgeld für Kinder, Kinderzuschlag, Wohngeld für Haushalte mit Kindern, beitragsfreie Mitversicherung des Ehepartners in der gesetzlichen Krankenversicherung, relativ ermäßigter Beitrag zur gesetzlichen Pflegeversicherung für Eltern mit Kindern im Vergleich zu Kinderlosen, Ehegattensplitting, steuerlicher Entlastungsbetrag für Alleinerziehende, Absetzbarkeit der Kinderbetreuungskosten, Kinderbetreuung, Unterhaltsvorschuss für Alleinerziehende. Zusätzlich werden die ehe- und familienbezogenen Leistungen in der Alterssicherung untersucht, dies sind die Kindererziehungs- und Kinderberücksichtigungszeiten in der gesetzlichen Rentenversicherung, die Hinterbliebenenversorgung und das Rentensplitting sowie die Kinderzulage bei der Riester-Rente.

Datenbasis SOEP und FiD

Zentrale Datenbasis für die Untersuchungen waren das SOEP und FiD. Auch im DIW Berlin wurden eine Reihe von Expertisen und Gutachten erarbeitet. Im Herbst soll ein zusammenfassender Abschlussberichts vorgelegt werden.

SOEP v28 also available via SOEPrermote

We offer our remote execution system, SOEPrermote, for users of more detailed regional data extending to the county level. The data provided there were updated in late November 2012 to include SOEP Version 28. This also involved updating the software used in it to the current version, Stata 12.

We are currently working hard to produce the new dataset for the years 1984–2012, which will be released as soon as possible to all users in the EEA countries (others will receive their data from Cornell). We also hope to offer a way for you to down-

load version 29 of the SOEP data from the web— of course in compliance with data protection law.

SOEP-IS 2011 Data Release

The generation of user-friendly variables for the first wave of the SOEP Innovation Sample in 2011 is finished, and the data on the core questions in the SOEP-IS are now available. Documentation on the instruments used in the sample can be found at: http://panel.gsoep.de/soep-docs/surveypapers/diw_ssp0110.pdf

For the first time ever, the data are only being provided in “long format:” a compressed form of the SOEP data. Rather than being provided as wave specific individual files, all available years are pooled in long format.

The data will be provided to all users who have signed a standard SOEP data distribution contract. The data can be downloaded by means of a personalized link.

Use SOEP-IS for New Research Questions

Deadline for the 2014 Survey: December 31, 2013

We would like to remind you of the possibilities of the SOEP Innovation Sample (SOEP-IS) and encourage you to consider using this instrument in the conception of new empirical research questions. SOEP-IS is well suited for short-term experiments but particularly for long-term surveys that are not possible in the framework of the core SOEP—for example, because the instruments are not yet established or the questions deal with very specific research interests. The SOEP Innovation Sample is not designed for one-time pretesting of questions that have no relation to the content of the SOEP.

Send us your proposals

We offer researchers at universities and research institutes worldwide the opportunity to use this sample for innovative research projects, to help shape the catalog of questions in the SOEP, and to obtain the data very rapidly for analysis. We would be especially happy to receive proposals from doctoral students.

Starting with the 2013 survey year, the contents of SOEP-IS will be determined in a competitive refereed process to select and implement the “best” research questions and their operationalizations. The SOEP research data center has added the distribution of the SOEP-IS data to its services, and the SOEP-IS data will be provided to external users as an independent dataset.

5,000 people in almost 3,000 households in 2013

In 2013, almost 5,000 people in 2,850 households will participate in the SOEP Innovation Study. Many of these women and men have been answering core SOEP questions since 1998 or 2009 as part of an extension sample to the SOEP, thus already providing a wealth of longitudinal data for the SOEP Innovation Sample.

Deadlines

Researchers interested in submitting questions should contact SOEP Survey Management by November 30, 2013, to present their proposal. If the project is determined to be viable from a survey methodology perspective, an official application procedure will follow. The official application must be received by December 31, 2013.

Applications should be submitted in English to soep-surveymanagement@diw.de.

Evaluation

A subcommittee of the SOEP-Survey Committee will then evaluate and rate the relevance and significance of the proposed questions. If the proposed project already has funding from the DFG or other sources, this step of external evaluation will be skipped. Since DFG and other projects also require a guarantee of survey methodological feasibility, interested researchers should contact SOEP Survey Management before submitting an application for funding to the DFG or other renowned funding agencies.

IAB-SOEP Migration Sample

The Institute for Employment Research (IAB) in Nuremberg and the Socio-Economic Panel (SOEP) research infrastructure at DIW Berlin have entered into a partnership to survey immigrants in Germany. In early summer of 2013, specially trained interviewers from the survey institute TNS Infratest will survey 2,500 households containing at least one person who has immigrated to Germany or has foreign citizenship, or whose parent or parents have immigrated to Germany or have foreign citizenship.

First wave will be released in late summer 2014

The sample was drawn based on the Integrated Employment Biographies Sample of the IAB, a dataset comprising all individuals who have been employed in Germany at least once, are registered as unemployed or seeking employment, or who received benefits such as Unemployment Benefit I and II or other similar forms of government assistance. The selection procedure provides comprehensive representation of members of the labor force with an immigration background and their family members in Germany. The first wave of the IAB-SOEP Migration Sample will be released to the research community in late summer of 2014 for secondary analysis.

Questionnaire

The questionnaire, which is answered by all adults in the household, comprises all core questions that have been part of the SOEP study for the last three decades. Beyond this, the survey also covers each respondent’s complete immigration history, education and training completed in Germany and abroad, employment history in Germany and other countries, and numerous aspects of the cultural and living environments that are relevant to the social integration of immigrants.

Oversampling of certain immigrant groups

Certain nationalities are given special consideration in the IAB-SOEP Migration Sample: it includes an above-average percentage of households containing immigrants from Poland, Romania, the CIS countries, Turkey, the former Yugoslavia, and the countries of Europe (Italy, Spain, Greece) as well as Arab or predominantly Muslim countries.

SOEP-REC-LINK

For a randomized percentage of the households, we plan to link the survey data—upon obtaining the permission of the individuals affected—with information from the Integrated Employment Biographies. This will create a new source of data

for scientific use that brings together the comprehensive information of a household survey with the precise labor market information of the social insurance data. In adherence to strict data protection and privacy regulations, this unique new database will provide precise labor market information from the social insurance system in fully anonymized form. This additional project using innovations in survey methodology and entitled “SOEP-RECLINK“ will receive three years of funding under the Leibniz Association’s Pact for Research and Innovation (Director: Martin **Kroh**).

SOEP subsample

The survey data will be integrated into the SOEP as a subsample. The SOEP already included an oversampling of “guest workers” in Germany in the 1984 household survey “Living in Germany” and has expanded this sample numerous times since then. The new IAB-SOEP Immigration Sample will be the most significant increase of immigrants in the thirty-year history of the SOEP.

Funding

The IAB-SOEP Migration Sample has been funded by the Federal Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs, the Federal Employment Agency, and by federal and Länder governments under the auspices of the Leibniz Association. Herbert **Brücker** from the IAB in Nuremberg and Jürgen **Schupp** from DIW Berlin are scientific directors of the project.

Three-Wave Household Panel Survey in Western Mongolia

DIW Berlin is working with the National Statistical Office of Mongolia (NSO) to conduct a three-wave household panel survey in Western Mongolia. This is being carried out in the framework of the BMBF-funded project “Coping with climate shock in Mongolia”, which deals with the effects of climate change on the wellbeing and activities of households in Mongolia. One focus of the study is

on extreme winter weather events (known as “zud disasters”). As climate change continues to progress, it can be expected that such climate shocks will become more frequent and more devastating.


The nomadic lifestyle of many households requires the use of new survey instruments to find households after the first survey year. Strategies for this were developed in a meeting on June 14, 2013, at DIW Berlin. Participants in the meeting included Gert G. **Wagner** (Executive Board Member, DIW Berlin), Mr. **Mendsaikhan** (Chairman of the NSO), Ms. **Oyunchimeg** (Head of the Department of Social Statistics at the NSO) and Kati **Schindler** (Project Head, DIW Berlin).

SOEP Timeline Series “30 Years of the SOEP”

To be released in print form

Since early February of this year, when interviewers from Infratest began ringing doorbells across Germany for the thirtieth time since the first wave of the SOEP, we have been posting a timeline series of milestones in the 30-year history of the SOEP in the context of important events in German and world history. This special SOEP timeline series appears every Friday in German and English on our Facebook page at <http://www.facebook.com/SOEPnet.de> and on the SOEP webpage at <http://www.diw.de/soep-chronicle>. The 30-Year SOEP Timeline Series will be released in print form, complete with pictures, at the **Colloquium on Happiness Research in Berlin** this fall.

SOEPmonitor

The SOEPmonitor provides time series for selected indicators since the mid-1980s that were calculated based on the SOEP data.

The most important function of the monitor is to give scientific users of the SOEP benchmarks for their own studies. At the same time, the time series in SOEPmonitor represent a collection of social indicators similar to those provided by the Federal Statistical Office. Each issue of the SOEPmonitor contains data series from 1984 to the most recent release. Data since 1990 are separated into East and West Germany and in all cases are provided at both household and individual levels.

Some of the data series are not easy to interpret—for example, in cases where details of the survey questions underlying the figures have changed. New special samples (e.g., high-income sample G, which started in 2002), have led to gaps in the data. The data in the SOEPmonitor should therefore be interpreted with care.

At the household level, the SOEPmonitor contains information on the households' living situations; at the individual level, it contains figures on respondents' labor market activities. The current SOEPmonitor can be downloaded at:

The release includes data updated to the 2011 waves of the German Socio-Economic Panel (SOEP), Household Income and Labour Dynamics in Australia Survey (HILDA), Swiss Household Panel (SHP), and Russia Longitudinal Monitoring Study-Higher School of Economics (RLMS-HSE), the 2009 wave of the US Panel Study of Income Dynamics (PSID). As in the past, researchers can analyze CNEF file of the 2010 wave of the Canadian Survey of Labour and Income Dynamics survey (SLID) through Statistics Canada. We have plans to update the BHPS-CNEF files (to add data from the Understanding Society study) if and when we can secure funding.

All users who were active last year (those with valid contracts who got passwords from Cornell) will automatically receive the disks with the updated data. Other registered users will receive a letter to let them know they may request the data.

SLID-CNEF data not to be collected, new Canadian longitudinal survey launched

The 2010 SLID-CNEF data is the last wave that will come from SLID. Starting in 2011, SLID will be a purely cross-sectional sample. Statistics Canada is planning to produce a CNEF file from their new panel survey titled the "Longitudinal and International Study of Adults" (LISA). Statistics Canada expects those data to become available after 2013. As soon as the file is available, we will alert users and e-mail include instructions about how to access them.

Research appointments

In February 2013 Dean Lillard was appointed as DIW Research Professor and in May he was elected as a Research Associate in the National Bureau of Economic Research program on Health Economics.

Presentations

Dean Lillard delivered one of two keynote speeches at the 1st International RLMS-HSE User Conference in Moscow, Russia. The conference, held May 17-18, 2013, featured research that uses data from the Russia Longitudinal Monitoring Survey of the Higher School of Economics. The title of his speech was, "The promise and po-

tential of the RLMS-HSE (and other panel data sets) in an interconnected world."

Rebekka Christopoulou (Ohio State University) presented a paper at the 10th IZA Annual Migration Meeting (AM²) in Jerusalem, Israel June 2-7, 2013. The paper, titled "Migration to the US and Marital Mobility" uses SOEP, BHPS, and US Current Population Survey data to estimate whether migration to the US makes it more or less likely that migrants to marry a spouse with higher relative education than they would have had they not migrated. The paper is coauthored with DIW Research Professor Dean Lillard (Ohio State University) and Professor Daniel Lichter (Cornell University)

Dean Lillard (Ohio State University) has presented a paper, coauthored with Rebekka Christopoulou, at the The 27th Annual Conference of the European Society for Population Economics (ESPE) June 12-15, 2013, at Aarhus University, Denmark. That paper, titled "Does Migration to the US Cause People to Smoke?", uses data from the BHPS and Tobacco Use Supplements to the Current Population Survey to estimate the causal effect of migration on smoking behavior.

The Best SOEP Publication Prize 2013

The Society of Friends of DIW Berlin (Vereinigung der Freunde des DIW Berlin, VdF) sponsors a prize to honor the best publications based on SOEP data in the previous two years. This prize is awarded in the years in between the biennial SOEP User Conferences. This year, the prize will be awarded at the SOEP Anniversary Colloquium on Happiness Research.

There are three prize categories, with multiple winners possible in each:

- the best scientific publication
- the best scientific publication by a junior researcher (not older than 35 years)
- the best journalistic paper or essay in the popular media

The €5,000 prize money will be divided among the winners.

Publications are eligible if they are based on SOEP data and have been published since the last SOEP

Best Paper Prize. The current period of eligibility was therefore January 1, 2011, to December 31, 2012. We considered all papers that have been submitted to our SOEPlit database in the selection process.

In order to be considered eligible for the SOEP prize, an original work had to be published in either a scientific or a popular journal/newspaper or as a book (or chapter) by a commercial publisher AND registered in the SOEPlit database by December 31, 2012. Discussion papers, copies of PhD theses (“Doktorarbeiten”) and the like, and papers with authors/co-authors belonging to the SOEP group or the SOEP Survey Committee are not eligible.

Participants of the Ninth International Young Scholar German SOEP Symposium

Report on the Ninth International Young Scholar German SOEP Symposium



On March 21–22, 2013 the Bremen International Graduate School of Social Sciences (BIGSSS) together with the SOEP and the Hanse-Wissenschaftskolleg (HWK) held the Ninth International Young Scholar German Socio-Economic Panel Symposium in Delmenhorst. Fifteen national and international doctoral students from disciplines including economics, sociology, and political science who use of the SOEP data were given the opportunity to present their empirical research in progress. BIGSSS PhD fellows Anne-Luise **Baumann** and Maike **Schulz** were in charge of the coordinating the event and did an excellent job.

Broad array of topics

The presentations covered diverse topics ranging from migration and education to labor market participation and health, and also included methodological studies and microsimulations. The conference is unique in matching doctoral students one-on-one with senior scholars in the same field of research. Several current and former members of the SOEP team as well as other renowned national and international scholars provided their expertise as commentators on the doctoral students' work.

The first conference day included a SOEP lecture by Jürgen **Schupp**, director of the SOEP, who outlined the latest innovations in the study and plans for the future of the SOEP data. After the official part of the conference, the participants spent the rest of the evening socializing at the local bar.

Two new features

First, the symposium was opened up this year to scholars working with longitudinal datasets other than the SOEP. There were presentations based on the British Household Panel Survey (BHPS) and the British Cohort Study, and also studies matching SOEP data with the German Survey of Income and Expenditures (EVS) as well as regional data from the German statistical offices. Second, the best conference contribution was awarded the Joachim Frick Best Paper Prize (€200). The prize was given to Alexandra **Avdeenko** (DIW/SOEP) for her paper "Intergenerational transmissions and

sibling correlations in extreme right-wing party affinity and attitudes towards immigration."

Lively and fruitful discussions

On the whole, the symposium was characterized by lively and fruitful discussions, and all participants were very satisfied. The HWK did an outstanding job in providing the facilities and organizing the catering and hotel accommodations.

The SOEP Symposium will celebrate its tenth anniversary next year, followed, we hope, by many more successful conferences in the years to come!

Steven Boker is Professor of Quantitative Psychology, Director of the Human Dynamics Laboratory, PI of the OpenMx SEM Software project, Speaker-Director of the UVA section of the International Max Planck Research School on the Life Course (LIFE), and Area Head of the Quantitative Psychology Area at the University of Virginia, department of Psychology.

The MIDDLE Approach

New paradigm for the design and analysis of research

Steven **Boker** talked about Maintained Individual Data Distributed Likelihood Estimation (MIDDLE). This is a new paradigm for the design and analysis of research in the behavioral, social, and health sciences. The MIDDLE approach is based on the seemingly impossible idea that data can be privately maintained by participants and never revealed to researchers, while still enabling statistical models to be fit and scientific hypotheses tested.

Likelihood of individual's data is calculated locally by mobile device

MIDDLE rests on the assumption that data should belong to, be controlled by, and remain in the possession of participants. Since data have value, individuals can thus accumulate personal wealth by participating in science. The innovation of the MIDDLE approach is that statistical models are fit by sending an objective function and vector of parameters to each participant's personal device (e.g., smartphone), where the likelihood of that individual's data is calculated locally. Only the likelihood value is returned to the central optimizer. The optimizer aggregates likelihood values from all participants and chooses new parameters until the model converges.

Allows individual-level longitudinal data sharing of many studies simultaneously

The MIDDLE paradigm solves or simplifies many current problems that plague human participant research. A MIDDLE study provides significantly greater privacy for participants; automatic management of opt-in and opt-out consent; lower cost for the researcher and funding institute; a larger base of participants; and faster determination of results. MIDDLE facilitates the use of mobile devices that can enable studies to be performed while participants remain in their normal living environments, thus opening paradigm-shifting paths in the way one thinks about research methods. Furthermore, if a participant opts into many studies simultaneously, all of the studies could automatically have access to individual-level longitudinal data sharing.



BeNA Lecture Series

The 2013 lecture in the BeNA Lecture Series was given by Daniel S. **Hamermesh** (University of Texas at Austin) on April 4-5, 2013, at the Humboldt University, Berlin. This year's topic was "Discrimination: Theory, Measurement, Applications and Policy." The lecture gave attendees an insight into several theories of discrimination and presented issues of measurement. The extent of discrimination along various dimensions was examined.

The lecture series was attended by about 50 participants coming from a variety of European universities. By the end of the entertaining and interesting workshop the students had a better feel for what as yet unanswered questions merit exploration. 

MEINE WOCHE

Nur vier Prozent Frauen

Jeden Montag berichten hier Menschen, wie sie ihre Woche gestalten. Heute: Elke Holst, Quotenforscherin.



Ich bin Elke Holst, ich bin Volkswirtin und auch Forschungsdirektorin für Geschlechterstudien am Deutschen Institut für Wirtschaftsforschung. Ich arbeite in der Abteilung sozio-ökonomisches Panel, einer seit 1984 laufenden Wiederholungsbefragung von Haushalten in Deutschland.

Mit einer Kollegin zusammen schaue ich mir seit einigen Jahren die 200 größten Unternehmen in Deutschland an, die 100 größten Banken, die 60 größten Versicherungen und die Betriebe, an denen der Bund beteiligt ist. Wir gucken, wie sich der Anteil von Frauen in Vorständen und Aufsichtsräten verändert. Mit unserer Arbeit haben wir die Grundlage dafür gelegt, dass die Diskussion um Frauen in Führungspositionen auf einer sachlicheren Basis geführt werden kann. Die Diskussion um Spitzenpositionen gab es vorher nicht.

In den 200 größten Unternehmen haben wir immer noch nur vier Prozent Frauen in den Vorständen. Die Diskussion ist aber in Gang gekommen vor dem Hintergrund, dass sich so wenig bewegt. Dass Frauen einfach nicht die Karriereleiter hochkommen. Man kennt den Begriff der gläsernen Decke, an der Frauen hängen bleiben. Aber eigentlich fängt das viel früher an: bei der traditionellen Aufgabenteilung im Haushalt. Daraus haben sich Klischees über die Fähigkeiten und Eigenschaften von Frauen und Männern entwickelt. Da vor allem Männer in Führungspositionen sind, passen die Klischees über Männer und Führung viel mehr zusammen als über Frauen und Führung. Frauen weist man eher den häuslichen Bereich zu. Daher traut man einer Frau häufig gar nicht so viel zu wie einem Mann.

In anderen Ländern, etwa in Frankreich, nehmen Frauen öfter Führungspositionen ein. Frankreich ist genauso konservativ wie wir. Aber dort wurde die Kinderbetreuung früh umgesetzt und es herrscht eine andere Einstellung zur Erwerbstätigkeit von Müttern. Nur in Deutsch-

land gibt es den Begriff Rabenmutter. Mit dem Ehegattensplitting wird die traditionelle Aufgabenteilung im Haushalt unterstützt und nutzt Ehepaaren mit sehr unterschiedlichem Einkommen. Für Zweitverdiener, das sind meist die Frauen, steigt der

Anreiz in Teilzeit zu arbeiten oder die Erwerbstätigkeit zu unterbrechen. Der Preis ist, dass die Frauen nicht die notwendige Berufserfahrung für einen qualifizierten Posten sammeln können.

Ich habe einen recht langen Arbeitstag. Das liegt auch daran, dass ich sehr engagiert bin und viele Vorträge halte und netzwerke. Ich rede mit PolitikerInnen, in Unternehmen, auf wissenschaftlichen Veranstaltungen. Ich versuche, auf allen Ebenen unsere Ergebnisse darzulegen und ihre Relevanz für die Politik herauszustellen. Diese Woche bin ich bei Mitgliedern des Bundestags. Über die Leibniz-Institute, zu denen wir gehören, sind die WissenschaftlerInnen sind eingeladen worden. Ich gehe grundsätzlich zu allen Parteien unabhängig von rechts, links. Für 2015 erwarten wir einen großen demografischen Wandel, es wird einen Rückgang an erwerbsfähigen Personen in unserer Gesellschaft geben, der schwer zu verkraften sein wird. Da ist klar, dass es fatal wäre, auf die gut ausgebildeten Frauen zu verzichten.
