A note on ... inequality

The inequality in the distribution of living standards is a hotly debated topic, both in the research community and in the public arena. But what do we mean by “living standard”? A household’s living standard is determined by the material comfort derived from the available goods and services. Economists consider income or wealth to be useful proxies for living standards. This is because income and wealth not only determine consumption but also affect access to areas such as education and health.

Why we should care

Inequality has its price [Stiglitz]. Indeed, Robert J. Shiller, winner of the 2013 Alfred Nobel Memorial Prize in Economics, has argued that the recent rise in inequality in many societies is the most important problem we are facing today. This is for economic, societal, as well as political reasons. High inequality may harm the economy [IMF] because credit rationing prevents the poor from investing in education and weakens innovations [Acemoglu and Robinson]. High inequality may reduce social cohesion because people are less likely to trust each other and therefore reduce their community involvement. High inequality may lead to the emergence of economic elites who may use their power to (re)shape the political system and gain special benefits, creating a vicious circle.

Achievements

Researchers from the social sciences and related disciplines have devoted their academic lives to measuring inequality and understanding its drivers and implications. Influential works have been published by scholars such as Vilfredo Pareto, Simon Kuznets, Amartya Sen, Anthony Atkinson, and, recently, Thomas Piketty, and Emmanuel Saez.

This research has not only provided theoretical, axiomatic, and econometric foundations paving the way for recent studies; it has also set the guidelines [Canberra Group] and defined the crucial ingredient in measuring inequality: micro data on income and wealth. Today, scientific surveys like the SOEP as well as administrative sources provide data on numerous countries and several decades. Perhaps the most influential database is the Luxembourg Income Study (LIS), founded in the early 1980s by Timothy Smeeding, Lee Rainwater, Gaston Schaber, and several others. LIS compiles and harmonizes micro data for numerous OECD countries and makes these data available to the scientific community. The original data in LIS are collected by national institutions like the SOEP. The significance of a high-quality data infrastructure is reflected by the decision of Paul Krugman, 2008 winner of the Alfred Nobel Memorial Prize in Economics, to take a position as a Distinguished Scholar at LIS under the current directorship of Janet C. Gornick. Another important resource is the OECD income distribution database, which

provides comparable inequality figures on OECD countries—again, the SOEP is one of the contributors.

Inequality, growth, and crises

Today’s spectrum of research on inequality extends beyond the computation of inequality indices and addresses further aspects such as inter- and intra-generational mobility, poverty, equality of opportunities, and the interrelations between inequality and economic development, societal cohesion, and democracy. Possibly the two most debated inequality topics today are the relationship between economic development and inequality and the interrelations between economic crises and inequality.

With regard to the long-term relationship between economic development and inequality, Kuznets argued in a pioneering work from the 1950s that the long-term evolution of inequalities is inverse U-shaped. Thomas Piketty’s influential and intensely debated *Capital in the Twenty-First Century*, however, argues that the inverse U-shape is not necessarily a product of deep economic forces (i.e., technological progress) but rather that real estate values decreased instead of wage inequalities, and did so for reasons (such as income taxation) that were not specifically economic. This would imply that a decrease in inequality will not necessarily be ongoing—and in fact, inequalities in the US and in other developed countries have increased over the last few decades.

The interrelations between economic crises and rising inequality have gained increasing attention since the 2007/8 financial crisis and the subsequent global recession. This recent recession is likely to have altered the shape of both the income and the wealth distribution and will probably continue to do so in the future. But who is “paying” for the crisis? Is the crisis mainly harming the poor and average taxpayers, or is it reversing the pre-crisis boom in top incomes? Does it harm people in industrialized countries more or those in emerging and developing countries? From another point of view, was it the pre-crisis increase in inequality that led to the crisis? Such questions have sparked a great deal of interest in recent years, both in academia and among the broader public. The SOEP is an extremely valuable database on Germany for cutting-edge research on these pressing questions. To offer researchers a forum to present and discuss their results on these questions, a conference on “Crises and the Distribution” will be held in Berlin on September 29 and 30, 2014. It has been organized jointly with the Freie Universität Berlin, the German Institute for Economic Research (DIW Berlin) / Socio-Economic Panel (Berlin), and the Journal of Income Distribution (see <http://www.jid-online.org/> for details).

Die meisten Beiträge hierzu beruhen auf Daten des SOEP. Welchen Preis zahlen Gesellschaft und Ökonomie für das Festhalten an tradierten Strukturen und Geschlechterstereotypen? Wie soll mit dem Problem der langfristig nicht gelösten Sorgearbeit umgegangen werden? Wie können Wege aussehen, die Frauen und Männern den gleichen Zugang zu den unterschiedlichen Lebensbereichen ermöglichen? Welche kulturellen Herausforderungen sind von Frauen und Männern auf diesem Weg zu bewältigen?

Die Tagung trägt Analysen und Ergebnisse aus der Wissenschaft zusammen und diskutiert diese mit Vertreterinnen und Vertretern aus Politik und Wirtschaft. Ziel ist es, Impulse für die politische Debatte um Wege in einer geschlechtergerechte, zukunftsfähige und prosperierende Wirtschaft und Gesellschaft zu geben.

Bericht Lange Nacht der Wissenschaften

SOEP war am 10. Mai in Berlin dabei

Die Besucher_innen des DIW bei der Langen Nacht der Wissenschaften konnten am Infostand des Sozio-oekonomischen Panels (SOEP) in der DIW-Lounge einen Online-Fragebogen ausfüllen und die Antworten mit den repräsentativen SOEP-Datensätzen abgleichen, für die etwa 30.000 Haushalte Jahr für Jahr Angaben machen. Wie stark interessieren Sie sich für Politik? Wie zufrieden sind Sie mit Ihrem persönlichen Einkommen? Machen Sie sich Sorgen um den Anstieg der Inflation?

Mit dem Mini-SOEP-Fragebogen, den die Besucher_innen am Laptop ausfüllten (Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing – CAPI) wurde gleichzeitig sowohl datenschutzrechtlich wie technisch getestet, wie das SOEP als „Referenz-Studie“ für die immer populärer werdenden „Bürgerdialoge“ dienen kann. „Dieser Test verlief erfolgreich“, erklärte Gert G. **Wagner**. Im gerade erschienenen **SOEPPaper Nr. 666** kann man mehr dazu nachlesen.

Wie immer bei der Langen Nacht der Wissenschaften konnten die Besucher_innen im DIW Berlin einen „Greifkrafttest“ absolvieren, wobei sie nicht schlecht staunten, dass ein bloßes Ziehen an einem Metallgriff verlässlich Auskunft geben kann über die Veränderung ihres Gesundheitszustands. So gab es für viele Besucher_innen die ein oder andere kluge Erkenntnis bei der Langen Nacht der Wissenschaften – über die Welt der Ökonomie genauso wie über die eigene Zukunft.

International version

Since very recently, we have also been providing the international dataset (95%) upon request for free via secure download. The CNEF data are still only available on CD from Cornell University. Due to Dean Lillard’s move to Ohio State University, delays may be encountered in the delivery of the CNEF data.

New datasets

Wealth

In 2012, the SOEP again collected individual wealth information. The original data are stored in the file BCP. In the meantime, the generated wealth information has been updated to include wealth information from 2012. The files PWEALTH and HWEALTH are now available for download. If you are interested in obtaining these files, please contact Michaela Engelmann (soepmail@diw.de).

The process of imputing missing values for the previous wealth modules is documented in our SOEP Survey Papers [148](#) (SOEP 2002 – Editing and Multiple Imputation of Item-Non-Response in the 2002 Wealth Module of the German Socio-Economic Panel (SOEP)) and [146](#) (SOEP 2007—Editing und multiple Imputation der Vermögensinformation 2002 und 2007 im SOEP; in German). Documentation on the imputation of the recent wealth data will become available later.

SOEP-IS

The innovative modules for the 2014 SOEP-IS data collection have now been selected. We will be able to include 16 out of a total of 41 proposals submitted.

In the process of data collection for SOEP-IS 2014, we will also be purchasing about 100 smart phones for further research on the well-being and life satisfaction of SOEP-IS respondents. For this, we will use the experience sampling method (ESM), a research methodology that asks participants to stop at certain times and report on their experience in

real time. The telephones and the expertise of the SOEP group in conducting ESM surveys will be made available to all applicants in the future.

We would also like to mention again that the 2012 data from the SOEP-IS were released in April. The data are provided via secure download. Simultaneously with this data distribution, we are providing the data from the 2011 SOEP-IS modules:

- Implicit Association Test (IAT) and corresponding explicit questions measuring gender stereotypes.
- The measurement of the four facets of sensitivity to injustice (victim sensitivity, observer sensitivity, beneficiary sensitivity, perpetrator sensitivity).
- Questions about private, public, and company pensions.

With regard to the documentation on data collection in 2012, there is further news to report. We now have a “Release 2012” link on the SOEP website (www.diw.de/soep-is) where you can find all relevant information on the SOEP-IS, with links to details on the innovative modules by survey year, information on the evolution of subsamples, as well as the questionnaires, methodological reports by TNS Infratest, and documentation on the datasets themselves.

Use SOEP-IS for new research questions

**Deadline for 2015:
December 31, 2014**

We would like to remind you of the possibilities of the SOEP Innovation Sample (SOEP-IS) and encourage you to consider using this instrument in developing new empirical research questions. SOEP-IS is well suited to short-term experiments, but it is particularly useful for long-term surveys that are not possible in the framework of the core SOEP—whether because the instruments are not yet established or because the questions deal with very specific research issues.

For the 2014 survey of the SOEP-IS, we will be purchasing 111 smart phones for data collection using the experience sampling method (ESM). The telephones as well as the expertise of the SOEP group in conducting ESM surveys will be made available to the entire SOEP user community as of 2015. This type of survey is very labor-intensive and therefore requires additional resources. If you have an idea for using ESM in the SOEP-IS, please contact us for details.

The SOEP Innovation Sample is not designed for one-time pretesting of questions that have no relation to the content of the SOEP.

Send us your proposals

We offer researchers at universities and research institutes worldwide the opportunity to use this sample for their innovative research projects, thereby helping us to shape the catalog of questions in the SOEP and obtaining the resulting data very rapidly for their own analysis. We would be especially happy to receive proposals from doctoral students.

Since 2013, the contents of SOEP-IS have been determined in a competitive refereed process to select and implement the “best” research questions and their operationalizations. The SOEP Research Data Center distributes the SOEP-IS data to external users as an independent dataset.

5,500 people in 3,500 households in 2014

In 2014, almost 5,500 people in nearly 3,500 households will participate in the SOEP Innovation Sample. Many of these women and men have been answering core SOEP questions since 1998 as part of an extension sample to the SOEP, while others entered in 2009. These individuals provide a wealth of longitudinal data to the SOEP Innovation Sample.

Deadlines

Researchers interested in submitting questions should contact SOEP Survey Management by November 30, 2014, to present their proposal. If the project is determined to be viable from a survey methodology perspective, an official application procedure will follow. The official application must be received by December 31, 2014.

Evaluation

A subcommittee of the SOEP Survey Committee will then evaluate and rate the relevance and significance of the proposed questions. If the proposed project already has funding from the DFG or other funding agencies, this step of external evaluation will be skipped. Since projects funded by the DFG and other organizations providing research funding also require a guarantee of survey

methodological feasibility, interested researchers should contact SOEP Survey Management before submitting an application for funding.

Record Linkage between the SOEP-Migration Sample 2013 and the IAB Integrated Employment Biographies

Background

There is an increasing trend among surveys worldwide to connect respondent data with information from (governmental) administrative records. By using these linked data, researchers hope to validate, increase and specify their item sets and to lessen respondent burden. The SOEP has joined this promising development and seeks to connect the elaborated respondent data from the new SOEP Migration Sample with the precise and reliable information from the federal social insurance records. This linkage will create a unique dataset which will enable high-quality studies on topics concerning the interplay between migration-specific characteristics and individual labor biographies. In accordance with data protection legislation, a random sample of about two-thirds of the roughly 5,000 respondents in 2,700 households were asked to give their consent to data linkage after having completed the questionnaire and after being informed about the implications of consent. A second randomly selected group will be asked for their agreement during the second wave of the study, which is taking place this year.

Consent rates and selectivity

About 50% of the selected respondents gave their written agreement to record linkage. Due to the relatively large proportion of respondents who withheld consent, selectivity problems could arise. This means that respondents who gave their consent might differ significantly in some characteristics from interviewees who did not. To test this speculation, various multivariate models were estimated that analyzed the influence of variables from the fields of origin and legal status, labor market position and outcomes, language and integration, general demographics as well as household and interviewer characteristics on the probability to consent to the record linkage.

Overall, we found relatively few significant effects in our models, which is a positive sign for the quality of the data. Holding other variables constant, some groups of respondents seem to be somewhat less likely to agree to record linkage than others: among these are respondents without educational qualifications, of Turkish origin or Arab cultural affiliation, and employees and civil servants in low-qualified positions. The single most powerful negative influence in our models was exerted by a general reluctance to answer sensitive questions such as those about the respondent's income. We are currently assessing the necessity to provide data users with weights to control for these selectivity problems.

Data collection for PIAAC-L in progress

PIAAC-L stands for the extension of the Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC)—which was conducted as a cross-sectional study in 24 European countries in 2011/12 on behalf of the OECD—now as a longitudinal study. PIAAC-L is a cooperation project between the Leibniz Institute for the Social Sciences (GESIS), the National Educational Panel Study (NEPS) at the Leibniz Institute for Educational Trajectories (LifBi), and the Socio-Economic Panel (SOEP) at DIW Berlin.

The study aims at collecting and analyzing data on adult skills that are considered preconditions for successful participation in social life and in the work context.

The PIAAC-L sample will be followed for three more waves after the first PIAAC study: 2014, 2015, and 2016. At present, the data for the first wave of PIAAC-L (2014) are being collected. Respondents between the ages of 18 and 67 are currently answering a set of questions that overlap significantly with the SOEP survey instruments. Based solely on the individual survey in 2011/12, the current survey wave will additionally measure the household situation and collect information on respondents' living conditions and biographies. Respondents' partners living in the same household as well as other household members over the age of 18 are to be interviewed as well. Focal points of the survey are topics such as educational attainment, post-secondary education, employment, and income, as well as attitudes and opinions of the respondent.

Fieldwork started in March and will end in July 2014.

Integration of FiD into the SOEP



Since financing of the study Families in Germany (Familien in Deutschland, FiD) through the German Federal Ministry of Family Affairs (BMFS-FJ) has ended after four waves, the households surveyed in FiD will be included in the SOEP as of 2014. To justify this, the sensitivity of the combination of the samples was tested, comparing the distributions of selected variables in the SOEP with their distributions in the combined sample of both SOEP and FiD. Both households and individuals were used as units of analysis and selected variables were included, among them migration status, education and employment, and financial parameters such as poverty rate, income, and rent. Categorical variables were compared using bar plots, metric variables were presented in dot plots, checking means and confidence intervals against each other. Data were analyzed separately for 2010, 2011, and 2012 and also for East and West Germany where suitable.

The analysis showed that there are no considerable differences between the distributions of selected

variables in SOEP and in SOEP plus FiD. Confidence intervals in both samples overlapped for all tested variables, implying that the data distribution is hardly sensitive to the combination of both samples. However, since FiD contains a large number of families with children, the integration favorably reduces the variance of affected variables, such as the poverty rate of children under three.

Overall the analysis showed that the integration of FiD into SOEP is justified. All results can be downloaded [here](#).

SOEP staff members join BIM

New Berlin Institute for Empirical Research on Integration and Migration (BIM) at HU Berlin

Situated in the heart of the capital city, the Berlin Institute for Empirical Research on Integration and Migration (BIM) develops basic scientific principles and empirical data aimed at providing a factual basis for debate on integration issues in Europe, and investigates how integration and migration processes in Germany and Europe have unfolded so far and how they are likely to develop in the future. The BIM is designed for cooperative research and aims at building a broad base for establishing integration and migration research in Berlin. Through its research, the BIM transfers information and findings into the worlds of politics, civil society, and the media. Within the BIM, researchers from widely diverse scientific disciplines such as sports studies, psychology, and medicine work together with those from the social sciences, education, ethnology, and economics. The BIM, which is based at the HU Berlin and started its work in early April in close cooperation with researchers at DIW Berlin and Charité, is jointly funded and supported by the non-profit foundation Hertie-Stiftung, the German Football Association (Deutschen Fußball-Bund, DFB), and the Federal Employment Agency (BA). The Federal Government's Representative for Migration, Refugees, and Integration, State Minister Aydan Özoğuz, will chair the Advisory Board of the BIM.

Martin **Kroh**, Deputy Director of the Research Infrastructure Socio-Economic Panel (SOEP) at DIW Berlin and Professor at HU Berlin, will be Co-Director of both the department "Foundations of Integration and Migration Research" and the department "Labor Market, Migration, and Integration" at the BIM. Ingrid **Tucci** will also be contributing her expertise on the topic of migration and integration at the BIM.

The BIM research department "Labor Market, Migration, and Integration" focuses on the labor market trajectories of migrants and their children. "Assimilation into the labor market is not only a key motivation behind immigration to Germany; it is also an important indicator of immigrants' integration into German society" says Martin Kroh. "Despite the importance of the issue and the numerous studies that have been published, we still do not know all the factors that determine successful labor market assimilation."

Based on the SOEP data, which were expanded last year in cooperation with the Institute for Employment Research (IAB) to include a new migrant sample, researchers in the "Foundations of Integration and Migration Research" and the "Labor Market, Migration, and Integration" departments work to close this research gap.


Report: Panel Survey Methods Workshop 2014

The fourth international Panel Survey Methods Workshop took place this year on May 20-21, 2014, at the University of Michigan (Ann Arbor) under the direction of Prof. Mick **Couper** from the Institute for Social Research (ISR).

Around 40 researchers from different prospective longitudinal studies worldwide attended the workshop, where they discussed methodological challenges ranging from survey mode, measurement issues, non-response, attrition, paradata, and consent issues all the way to panel conditioning.

SOEP staff members Martin **Kroh**, David **Richter**, and Jürgen **Schupp** exchanged experiences with other survey representatives at the two-day meeting, where they presented their findings on panel conditioning and the Day Reconstruction Method used in the SOEP-IS for discussion.

On May 22, the day after the workshop, a special session was held at ISR on “Methodological Developments in Panel Studies”, moderated by the co-editor of the first anthology on panel methods

(published in 1989), Graham **Kalton** (ISR). In the session, each of the five leading panel studies worldwide—Household Panel Study of Australia (HILDA), BHPS/Understanding Society, Panel Study of Income Dynamics (PSID), Health and Retirement Survey (HRS), and the Socio-Economic Panel (SOEP)—presented their recent projects and developments and then discussed shared methodological challenges.

The next meeting will take place in two years. The fifth Panel Survey Methods Workshop will be held at DIW Berlin in June 21-22, 2016.

Report: 10th Young Scholar German SOEP Symposium

On March 20–21, 2014 the Bremen International Graduate School of Social Sciences (BIGSSS) together with the SOEP and the Hanse-Wissenschaftskolleg (HWK) held the Tenth International Young Scholar German Socio-Economic Panel Symposium in Delmenhorst. Fourteen national and international doctoral students from disciplines including economics, sociology, and political science were given the opportunity to present their empirical research. Alexandra **Avdeenko** and Adrian **Hille**, doctoral researchers of the DIW Graduate Center, were in charge of coordinating the event.

The tenth anniversary symposium

The annual conference is unique in matching doctoral students one-on-one with senior scholars. The presentations covered diverse topics ranging from life satisfaction, education and female labor supply, consumption, neighborhood, health, as well as preferences and expectations. Several current and former members of the SOEP team and of other DIW departments as well as other renowned national and international scholars provided their expertise as commentators on the doctoral students' work. Michaela **Engelmann** did a great job in compiling a wonderful brochure summing up the symposium's past ten years. The [brochure](#) gives insight into the scientific careers of former participants. Silke **Anger** (IAB, University of Bamberg), for instance, reported that as a young scholar she had benefited greatly from the lively discussions with experienced SOEP researchers and data producers. "The SOEP Symposium provided me with high-quality feedback on my project and was one of the cornerstones for a lifelong friendship with this fantastic data." Similarly, Thomas **Siedler** (University of Hamburg) remembers the symposium

as an ideal forum for meeting other doctoral students and exchanging experiences.

The first conference day included a special lecture on the origins of the symposium, which was held by one of the founders, Kathrin **Leuze** (University of Hannover). Moreover, Paul **Lambert** (University of Stirling), and Vernon **Gayle** (University of Edinburgh) gave a talk on the "Frontiers of longitudinal methods." After the official part of the conference, the participants spent the rest of the evening celebrating the anniversary at a local bar.

Joachim Frick Prize for Simon Rottke (QBER, University of Kiel)

While the focus was on papers using the SOEP data, some participants presented work carried out with other panel data. Their papers were based on the British Household Panel Survey (BHPS), the British Cohort Study, or matched SOEP data with the German Survey of Income and Expenditures (EVS) or regional data from the German statistical offices. A highlight was the presentation by Simon **Rottke** (Institute for Quantitative Business and Economics Research; Christian-Albrechts-University Kiel). In a joint paper with Alexander **Klos** (see [SOEPpaper 621](#)), he examined parental consumption behavior after a child moves out of the household. Simon made an outstanding presentation of this carefully conducted study, convincing the audience of the results. The complexity of their research involved a comparison of the consumption behavior of the SOEP respondents with self-reported behavior from the Italian Survey on Household Income and Wealth (SHIW). After a consultation with all discussants, the scientific committee—consisting of Olaf **Groh-Samberg** (BIGSSS), Jürgen **Schupp** (SOEP, DIW Berlin), and Markus **Tepe** (Universität Oldenburg)—awarded the paper the Joachim Frick Best Paper Prize (€200).

Highly satisfied participants

On the whole, the symposium was characterized by lively and fruitful discussions, and all participants were very satisfied. Many of the young scholars said they appreciated the discussion of their papers by well-chosen commentators, and the high quality of the comments and discussions. Participants were enthusiastic about the size of the group, the many interactions between young and senior scholars, as well as the interdisciplinary character of the event. Special thanks go to all senior discussants who prepared excellent presentations on the assigned papers.

Introducing Axel Glemser—in five questions

Axel Glemser is the new director in charge of SOEP at TNS Infratest Sozialforschung in Munich. He took up this new position on May 1, 2014. We had the opportunity to sit down with Mr. Glemser in Berlin and ask him a few questions.



What are your responsibilities in your new job?

I'm responsible for all the data collection work done by TNS Infratest on behalf of DIW Berlin. That means everything from writing the proposal and making the cost estimate to doing the sampling and questionnaire development all the way to conducting the survey and processing the data after the fieldwork has been concluded, as well as coding and testing. I have a broad-based team of around 20 experts behind me at TNS Infratest to help carry out these tasks. This also means that management questions are important. As a director, I'm only as good as my team.

What was your career path up to this point, and what are the key strengths you bring to your new job?

I started working at TNS Infratest in statistics in 1999. I was responsible for the whole range of sampling methods—face-to-face, telephone, online surveys. In 2006, I became a department head in charge of all “Sampling for Germany”, which meant that I was responsible for sampling as well as for weighting and overseeing the development of the samples. Having an overview of the entire data collection process is something that fascinates me to this day—looking at questions like: What is it I'm causing with my sample? What's happening with the sample in the field? What's coming back to us from the fieldwork? As an expert in survey research, I became an advisor on survey methodology in 2010 and worked closely with clients from a wide range of research fields. I'll be bringing both my methodological experience and my client perspective into my work with the SOEP.

When and how did you first hear about the SOEP?

It was back in 1999, during my first few weeks of work at Infratest. An innovation

sample had just been set up for the SOEP in the statistics department. I had the privilege of actually drawing the sample together with a co-worker. At the time, though, I didn't have a detailed understanding of the ideas behind the SOEP or know that these newly recruited households would later become part of the SOEP Innovation Sample (SOEP-IS).

What were you doing 30 years ago when the SOEP study was launched?

In 1984 I was still in school. Back then, my survey knowledge was limited to the “TED” televoting-system on the German TV game show “Wetten dass” (in English: “Wanna bet?”).

Looking to the future: What are your hopes for your own career—and what are your personal visions for the SOEP?

I hope to get off to a good running start in the first 100 days. I am delighted that there are already new projects where I can contribute my expertise. If things keep going like they are now, I'll be very happy. In this phase of enormous expansion underway in the SOEP—in particular with SOEP-IS and the refresher samples—the rising costs of high-quality interviewer-based surveys will be a significant challenge we will have to contend with in the years to come. A key task will be to maintain the same level of panel stability in the core sample that we have achieved up to now. Taking the step to create a SOEP Innovation Sample was also the right choice. In the future, the trend will be to use the Innovation Sample to push for new approaches—using cognitive and psychological tests, biomarkers, that is, designs that combine classic approaches with other study methods.

Now the grant regulations of DIW Berlin also allow us to offer up to three months of support for longer stays by post-docs, senior researchers, and professors from abroad (see [Visiting Young Scholars Program](#)).

SOEP Wave Report 2013

The SOEP's 2013 Wave Report has just been published. It provides an overview of the SOEP's activities in 2013, a year filled with numerous activities marking the SOEP's thirtieth survey wave. These included a timeline series tracing the development of the SOEP survey and life in Germany in the context of broader global events, the SOEP Anniversary Colloquium on Happiness Research, and Germany Federal President Gauck's recognition of SOEP respondents for their unique form of community service. The Wave Report covers all these events as well as other public relations activities.

The Wave Report also covers innovations and updates in the 2013 data distribution (SOEP v29, data

1984-2012) and TNS Infratest's report on fieldwork for the thirtieth wave of SOEP-Core and the third boost sample of SOEP-IS.

Short research papers by members of the SOEP group in this year's Wave Report once again give an impression of the current research questions that are being explored with the SOEP data.

Unemployment has a negative effect on the mental health of spouses

A study by former SOEP staff member, DIW Graduate Center alumnus, and current DIW Berlin employee Jan **Marcus** shows that an exogenous entry into unemployment (e.g., due to plant closure) is not only detrimental to the individual's own mental health but also to that of his or her spouse. According to Marcus, an expert in educational and health economics, when one spouse loses his or her job, the other spouse's mental health suffers almost equally. Whether it is the man or the woman who lost the job makes little difference. Marcus concludes: "The findings highlight that unemployment has severe consequences not just for the directly affected individuals, but also for their spouses. Hence, previous studies underestimate the public health costs of job loss as they do not consider the consequences for spouses".


