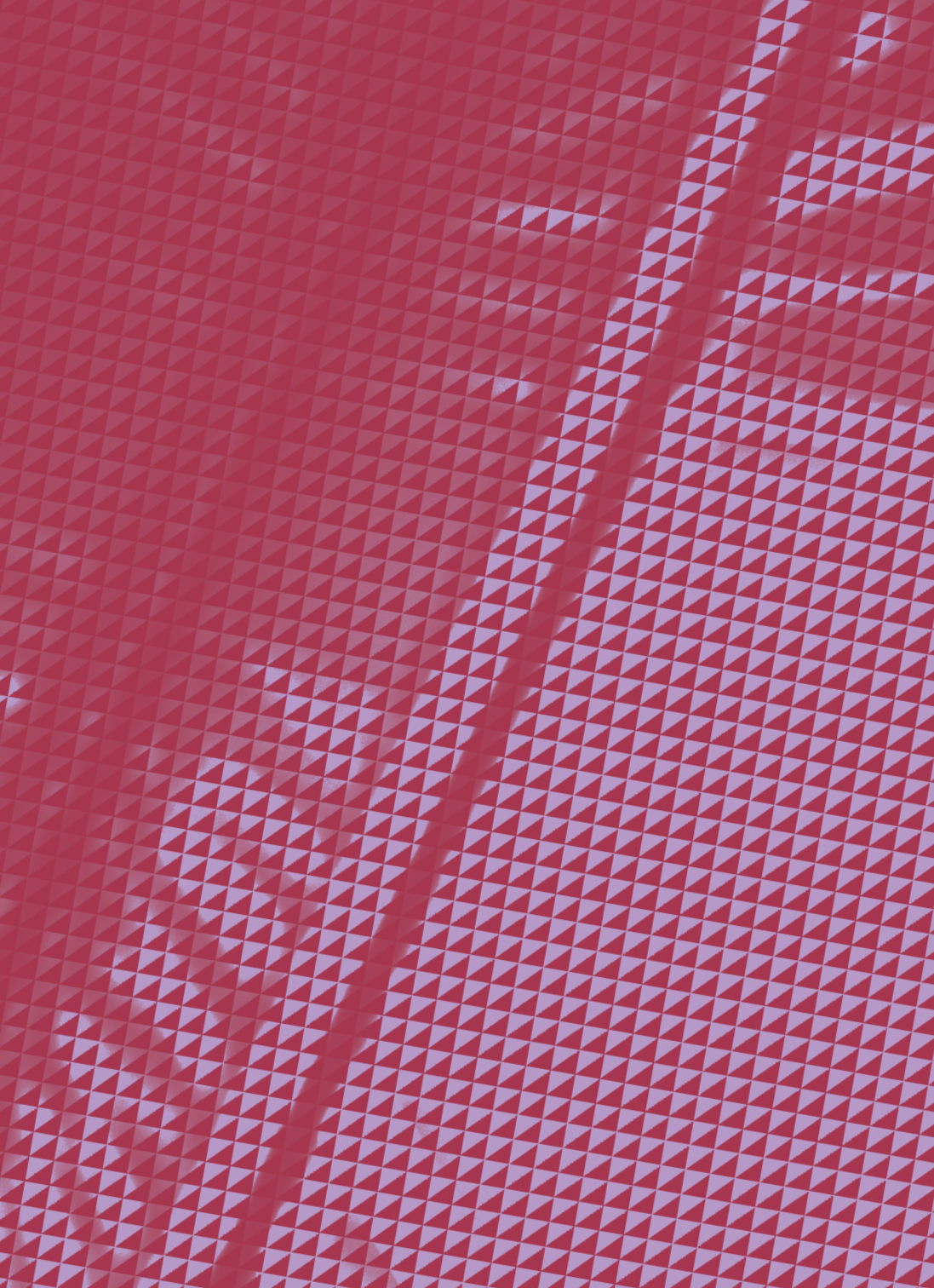

Abhängig von der inhaltlichen Ausrichtung stützt sich die Arbeit eher auf mikro- oder makroökonomische Ansätze.

The work of the research cluster is geared towards political relevance. The cluster's scientific advisory activity specifically targets national, European and international economic and development policy. The »Macroeconomics and Financial Markets« research cluster consists of the research departments Macroeconomics, Forecasting and Economic Policy and International Economics. All departments have a quantitative empirical orientation using modern econometric methods in common. Depending on the content, the work is based on either microeconomic or macroeconomic approaches.

Neben empirischen Untersuchungen zu insbesondere innovationsgetriebenen Veränderungen in den Wirtschafts- und Produktionsstrukturen werden mit Hilfe wettbewerbs- und verhaltensökonomischer Ansätze theoretische Aussagen über das Marktgeschehen hergeleitet und für die Bewertung verschiedener staatlicher Markteingriffe verwendet.

Das Cluster »Industrieökonomie« besteht aus den beiden Abteilungen Unternehmen und Märkte sowie Wettbewerb und Verbraucher.

In addition to empirical studies, theoretical statements about the market development are derived using approaches based on competition policy and behavioral economics. The empirical and theoretical findings are useful for evaluating the effect of various political instruments.

The focus is on empirical analyses which are based on representative microdata from the official statistics or the scientifically supported data infrastructure. The research cluster consists of the departments of Public Economics, Education and Family and the Research Infrastructure Socio-Economic Panel Study (SOEP).

Executive Board

Der Vorstand hat die Aufgabe, die strategische und organisatorische Ausrichtung des DIW Berlin zu gestalten und optimale Rahmenbedingungen für die Kernaufgaben des Instituts zu schaffen: Forschung, Politikberatung, Nachwuchsförderung und Infrastrukturbereitstellung. Zu diesem Zweck sind die beiden wissenschaftlichen Vorstandsmitglieder selbst wissenschaftlich aktiv. Im Vorstandsbereich sind drei Forschungsgruppen verankert: Gender Studies analysiert die wirtschaftliche, soziale und kulturelle Bedeutung der Geschlechter. Nachhaltige Entwicklung (bis 2016 Abteilung Entwicklung und Sicherheit) untersucht die Wirkung von Politikmaßnahmen auf die Lebensqualität von Menschen in Entwicklungs- und Transformationsländern. Entrepreneurship untersucht die Innovationsfähigkeit von kleinsten, kleinen und mittleren Unternehmen (KKMUs) sowie den Einfluss individueller Persönlichkeitseigenschaften der Entrepreneur*innen auf den Unternehmenserfolg. Ab 2019 werden die Forschungsgruppen den jeweiligen Clustern zugeordnet.

The Executive Board is responsible for structuring the strategic and organizational orientation of DIW Berlin and creating the optimal framework for the Institute's core tasks: research, policy consulting, promoting young talent, and the provision of infrastructure. For this purpose, the two scientific members of the Executive Board continue to engage in research activities. Three research groups are integrated into the Executive Board: The Gender Studies Research Group identifies and analyzes the economic, social, and cultural differences between men and women as well as the driving forces behind these disparities. The Sustainable Development Research Group (known as the Development and Security Department until 2016) focuses on policy measures that are aimed at strengthening the resilience of households in the face of extreme weather events. The Entrepreneurship Research Group investigates the innovative capacity of micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) as well as the influence of entrepreneurs' individual personality traits on company success. Beginning in 2019, the research groups will be assigned to the respective clusters.
